# Turkey Plans to Resettle Syrian Refugees

In a six-page document shared with UN Secretary-General António Guterres, Turkish President Recep Erdogan planned to settle 1 million Syrians in 140 villages in territories seized by Turkey during the October invasion of northeast Syria. The project — which will require more than US\$26 billion in foreign assistance — resembles a large residential development project, promising new residents access to schools, hospitals, mosques, sporting arenas and agricultural land. This comes amid concerns that Turkey is pressuring refugees to return to an area that remains unsafe, and that the move is intended to prevent the Kurdish population from returning to their traditional lands.

Saar Moves to Unseat Party Rival Netanyahu Mr Gideon Saar, a former interior and education minister, has launched his bid to unseat Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu as head of Likud, ahead of a party vote next Thursday (26

December). This marks the first serious internal challenge to Mr Netanyahu's helm of Likud

#### over the past decade. Recent polls have indicated that with Mr Saar as leader, Likud find it easier to create a national unity government with the Blue and White party if the March 2020 elections produces a deadlock.

In view of how the bulk of legislation vetoed by US President Donald Trump during his presidency involved congressional attempts to censure Saudi Arabia, The Washington Post put out an analysis on Wednesday (18 December) which argues that Mr Trump has a surprisingly consistent approach towards US-Saudi relations as he sees the kingdom as an eager customer for American arms and a useful proxy in Washington's confrontations with Iran.
