Turkey Drawn Deeper into Syrian War

Tensions between Turkish forces and the Syrian government continue to escalate following a Syrian army attack in the rebel-held northwestern province of Idlib that killed eight Turkish soldiers and a civilian contractor last week, and five more Turkish soldiers on Monday (10 February), reported The New York Times on Tuesday (12 February). Turkey is demanding a safe zone in northwestern Syria to prevent a further influx of Syrian refugees across the border, and to act as a buffer against Kurdish forces, which Turkey deems a threat.

Iran Marks Anniversary Amid Tensions with US

Tens of thousands of Iranians came together in Tehran on Tuesday (11 February) to commemorate

the 41st Islamic revolution against the backdrop of tensions with the United States over the assassination of General Qasem Soleimani, US sanctions and the upcoming parliamentary elections in the country. President Hassan Rouhani took the opportunity to bolster nationalist sentiments and unite Iranians against the United States, reported Al-Jazeera.


