

### Israel Heading for Fourth Election?

Securing just 36 seats to challenger Mr Benny Gantz's 33 after polls closed on Monday (2 March), incumbent Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu once again emerged as the winner of Israel's third election in less than 12 months. However, Mr Netanyahu's Likud party still lacks an overall governing majority in the Knesset, having secured only 58 seats in the 120-member parliament. To break the deadlock, intense coalition negotiations have begun again, though a fourth election seems increasingly likely.

#### Russia and Turkey Agree on Ceasefire After six hours of talks on Thursday (5 March), Russian President Vladimir Putin and Turkish

President Recep Tayyip Erdogan agreed to halt fighting in Syria's Idlib province, putting an end to escalating tensions that almost pushed both countries to the brink of open war. Russia supported Syrian President Bashar Al-assad's regime forces in their assault on the last major rebel stronghold in Idlib, while Turkey has sent troops to support the rebel stronghold. If these accords are enforced, Turkish and Russian forces will halt fighting, even though the Syrian government is insisting on continuing the attack on Idlib.

#### The number of coronavirus cases in Iran has reached the thousands, with 8 per cent of Iran's parliament also testing positive. However, the Iranian government has done little to manage

the pandemic. Instead, the authorities seem to be focusing their attention on improving Iran's nuclear capacities. The New York Times reported on Tuesday (3 March) that it now has enough enriched uranium to produce a single nuclear weapon, a move that experts say is aimed at pressuring the Trump administration.


#### The International Atomic Energy Agency's (IAEA) Board of Governors will meet next Monday (9 March) at its headquarters in Vienna, Austria. The UN agency is the main interna-

tional organisation seeking to promote the peaceful use of nuclear energy. Following Iran's recent refusal to answer questions from IAEA inspectors and denial of access to two of its three nuclear sites, this meeting will likely see members of the international

community call for greater transparency from Iran regarding its nuclear activities. India PM to Visit Egypt Next Week

#### Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi is expected to visit Cairo next Saturday and Sunday (14-15 March), his first visit to the Middle East in 2020. This visit seeks to expand India's strategic

ties with Egypt as well as to reaffirm India's commitment to Africa ahead of the fourth India-Africa Summit later this year. Both nations have a security agreement against terrorism as well as expanded bilateral military training co-operation.
