19 Killed during Iranian Naval Exercise

In the second missile accident of the year, a missile from an Iranian Navy frigate was fired at another Iranian naval vessel during a military exercise in the Gulf of Oman on Sunday (10 May), killing at least 19 sailors and wounding 15, reported The New York Times. The incident is still under investigation, with the navy stating that the Konarak, the missile boat, "had an incident and a number of the navy's seamen were martyred". Widespread mourning took place in Iran over social media, with criticism levelled at the military's lack of transparency and professionalism rising once again as Iranians recalled the downing of the Ukrainian airliner in



Pompeo Visits Israel over West Bank Plans US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo paid an eight-hour visit to Israel on Wednesday (13 May) to meet with Prime Ministers Benjamin Netanyahu and Benny Gantz in order to caution

Israel's leadership against pushing forward with plans to annex the West Bank, experts say. This prudence is somewhat surprising given President Trump's Middle East peace plan, which was seen by many to be a tacit approval of the annexation, but growing pressure from leaders of neighbouring Arab states appears to have prompted a new hesitance on the part of the Saudi Arabia Raises VAT from 1 July

As part of a slew of measures to address the economic impact of Covid-19, Saudi Arabia will be suspending the cost of living allowance as of 1 June and raising the value added tax (VAT) from 5 per cent to 15 per cent as of 1 July, reported Saudi Press Agency on Monday (11 May).

According to Finance Minister Mohammed Al-Jadaan, the twin measures are aimed at shoring up state finances, which have been strained by low oil prices and the pandemic. He warned that "strict and painful measures" were necessary to reduce expenditure, as the country struggles to protect its economy.




