

UAE Launches Mission to Mars

The United Arab Emirates (UAE) successfully launched its first mission to Mars on Monday (20 July) at 5.58am, marking the beginning of a seven-month space journey. To reduce its reliance on oil, the UAE continues to develop its scientific and technological capabilities. Though the objective of the Mars mission is to provide a comprehensive report on the planet's atmosphere, the UAE's ultimate goal is to build a human settlement on the Red Planet by 2117.

Wealthier Gulf states have been focusing on mass testing as a preventive measure to deal with the spread of the Covid-19 pandemic. By isolating the positive cases, they have allowed their economies to restart. The UAE is leading with the world's highest testing rates among

countries with more than a million inhabitants, and other Gulf states such as Bahrain and Qatar are following close behind. A critical outcome of this blanket testing approach in the Gulf has been the discovery of a far larger percentage of asymptomatic cases than in the West, with more than 80 per cent of those who test positive showing no symptoms. Qatar Airways Seeks Redress for Airspace Ban

Qatari flag carrier Qatar Airways has started four international investment arbitrations of up to at least US\$5 billion to seek redress for the airspace ban carried out by the UAE, Bahrain, Saudi Arabia and Egypt, according to a statement on Wednesday (22 July). The Saudi-led

bloc had cut diplomatic ties with Qatar in 2017 as they accused the kingdom of maintaining close ties with Iran and supporting terrorism. This month, Qatar won a legal round in the International Court of Justice and has jurisdiction to negotiate over the airspace.
