# Turkish Soldier Dies in Clashes With PKK

The conflict between Turkish forces and the Kurdish Workers' Party (PKK) has seen tensions worsen in recent months, with Turkey becoming more assertive in its foreign policy in the region. The latest casualty from the conflict was a Turkish soldier, who was killed last Sunday (28 June). Turkey has since launched an air and ground offensive against the Kurdish forces, bringing about criticism from countries like the United Arab Emirates (UAE), who believe that Turkey is infringing on Iraqi territory.


