Hit Teams, Robot Guns - Iran Agencies Play Blame Game Iranian security agencies have given differing accounts of how Mohsen Fakhrizadeh was

killed. The Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps has said the hit was carried out by a remotely-controlled machine gun. Eyewitnesses and others have said, however, that a wild shootout occurred between the hit team and the scientist's guard, while the Interior Ministry has claimed that it had raised warnings about an attack. The various accounts are an attempt by security agencies to deflect blame for a serious security lapse, revealing tensions within the country.

Bid to Ease Qatar Blockade Aimed at Iran Reports have emerged that Saudi Arabia will move soon to lift a ban on Qatar Airways

flights traversing its airspace. But rather than a step towards the easing of the blockade, analysts say the move, if it happens, is aimed at further squeezing Iran's economy. Currently, Qatar Airways pays an estimated US\$100 million annually in fees to Iran for the right to overfly its airspace. If Saudi Arabia eases its restrictions, Tehran's ailing economy will be deprived of a critical lifeline, ratcheting up the "maximum pressure" campaign in the Trump Administration's waning days.



Is Israel Heading for a Fourth Election?

After a preliminary proposal to dissolve Parliament was passed by Israeli legislators, it may get final approval as soon as next week. If it goes through, Israelis will go to the polls for the fourth time in less than two years next March. Critics of Prime Minister Benjamin

Netanyahu have charged that this was his plan all along, and that he never intended to

honour a deal with his rival, Benny Gantz. If a new election is called, Mr Netanyahu will have a decided advantage over his rivals, and may have enough support to form a coalition government with his party's right-wing allies.



A Role for China?



Erdogan to Visit Azerbaijan After Ceasefire

Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan will visit Azerbaijan next Wednesday and Thursday (9-10 December) after a ceasefire was struck between Armenia and Azerbaijan over the disputed Nagorno-Karabakh region. The truce established last month saw the ethnic Armenians agreeing to withdraw from the contested region of Azerbaijan. President Erdogan is expected to meet Azerbaijani President Ilham Aliyev after Ankara made an announcement on Tuesday



Lebanon: Hariri's Killer to be Sentenced The man who murdered former Lebanese Prime Minister Rafic Hariri will be sentenced next

Netherlands-based Special Tribunal for Lebanon found him guilty of five charges, including the premeditated killing of the former Prime Minister and 21 other persons using explosive materials. Mr Hariri served as Lebanon's prime minister twice before resigning in 2004 in protest against Syrian influence in Lebanese politics, and was killed in 2005 when 1,800 kg of TNT hidden in a van was detonated beside his motorcade.
