Fighting with Hamas and Civil Unrest Intensify

Israeli ground forces carried out attacks on Gaza early today, 14 May, without entering the densely populated coastal strip in an escalation of recent fighting with Hamas, which began with an exchange of Israeli airstrikes and rockets from Gaza a few days back. While battling Palestinian militants on one hand, on the other, Israel is seeking to head off its worst civil unrest in decades. Clashes between Arab and Jewish protestors and vigilantes have occurred on the streets of several mixed-ethnicity cities within Israel, including the central city of Lod. American and Egyptian diplomats were heading to Israel to begin de-escalation talks.

Qatari Emir Visits Saudi Arabia Qatari Emir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani arrived in Jeddah for his visit to Saudi Arabia

after the Al Ula declaration in January this year, which ended the diplomatic and economic boycott of Qatar by Saudi Arabia, the UAE, Bahrain and Egypt that began in June 2017. Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman Al Saud welcomed the Emir to Al-Salam Palace and the two discussed ways to develop bilateral co-operation in various fields and also spoke about regional and international developments, according to Alarabiya News.



US Fires Warning Shots at Iranian Patrol

Boats In the third naval incident in little more than a month, the New York Times reported that a US coast guard ship fired 30 warning shots after Iranian fast craft approached a group of six US navy ships. Two fast craft had broken off from a larger group of 13 and manoeuvred behind the US vessels, before approaching them at high speed with weapons uncovered and manned, a US Navy official told USNI News. The US ships, which included a guided-missile

cruiser and five patrol vessels, were escorting a guided-missile submarine transiting on the surface in the Strait of Hormuz. The incidents occur as Iranian and US negotiators continue


