

Washington Welcomes News of Direct Talks Between Iran and KSA The US welcomes the news of direct communication between long-time Middle Eastern rivals

Saudi Arabia and Iran, at a time when tensions are high in the region and Iran's recently-elected government has not held back in expressing its animosity towards the West. Saudi Arabia's Foreign Minister Prince Faisal bin Farhan al-Saud confirmed that the first talks between his country and Iran's new government had taken place, saying that the latest round happened on 21 September 2021. While Riyadh and Tehran have not conveyed any expectations of a major breakthrough, both sides have expressed support for easing tensions.

It appeared to be the first confirmed case of the software, known as Pegasus being successfully used to hack the phone of a sitting British official.

are growing accusations that the Houthis are using this impending ecological disaster as a

power play - with potentially catastrophic consequences, not least for Yemenis themselves. The FSO Safer, an ultra-large crude oil tanker stationed near Yemen's Hodeidah port has been "dead" since 2017 - its steam boilers have run out of fuel and can no longer generate the power and steam needed to run vital systems. Since the boilers on the Safer stopped working,



Iran Optimistic about Nuclear Deal Talks

Restarting Soon Iran's Foreign Minister Hossein Amir-Abdollahian said that he expects negotiations on the 2015 nuclear deal to restart in Austria soon. President Biden reversed Trump's decision to pull the US

from international negotiations on curbing Iran's nuclear ambitions but talks in Vienna to revive the deal have been at an impasse since June this year, when Iran's ultraconservative new

As Iraq readies for parliamentary elections this Sunday, 10 October, it is the party of renowned Shi'i Muslim cleric Moqtada al-Sadr that looks set to be kingmaker. Taking the largest share of the Iraqi parliament's 329 seats would mark the culmination of Sadr's years-long effort to consolidate power at the ballot box, on the streets and throughout the civil service. Sadr is a storied figure with a history of agitation against US troops after their invasion and has fierce
