S'pore To Deepen Ties with Saudi Arabia

Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong welcomed the strengthening of relations between Singapore and Saudi Arabia when he spoke to Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman over the phone on Tuesday, 8 February 2022. In a Facebook post, PM Lee said: "Our countries celebrate 45 years of diplomatic relations this year and we welcomed the deepening of relations, including economic co-operation through the Saudi-Singapore Joint Committee." During the phone conversation, they also discussed developments in Saudi Arabia.

Israel to Investigate Domestic Use of Spyware The intensifying scrutiny of NSO Group, the Israeli spyware firm, has largely come from

abroad as evidence mounted that authoritarian governments had used NSO products to spy on political opponents. Earlier this week, the controversy came home as the Israeli government said it would investigate reports that the Israeli police had illegally used spyware against its citizens without a court order, including a key state witness in the corruption trial of former Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu. The efforts constitute the Israeli government's most public expression of concern about NSO — once promoted by Israeli officials as a centrepiece of the Israeli tech industry.



Dubai to Attract 50 MNCs Within Three Years Dubai plans to attract 50 multinational companies (MNCs) within three years, the UAE

government said on Wednesday, citing a statement from the Dubai International Chamber. The plan is part of a three-year strategy to boost the Emirate's status as a global trade hub, in face of increased competition from Saudi Arabia. It added that it will also support 100 Dubai-based companies with international expansion.

The next leader of the Islamic State is likely to be from a close circle of battle-hardened Iraqi jihadists who emerged in the aftermath of the 2003 US invasion, two Iraqi security officials

The group of potential successors to Abu Ibrahim al-Quraishi, who blew himself up during a US operation to capture him in Syria last week, includes one commander whom Washington and Baghdad declared killed last year. Those following the Islamic State closely expect it to name a successor in the coming weeks, as the group continues a stubborn and deadly insurgency in the Middle East.
