

Egypt Hosts Israel, UAE for First Summit

Egypt hosted the first summit meeting with leaders of Israel and the UAE earlier this week, the latest sign of a swift realignment of Middle Eastern political alliances since Israel established diplomatic relations in 2020 with several Arab countries. Governments of the three countries were circumspect on what their leaders discussed at their meeting. The deliberately vague statements obscured an important development in the region as the Middle Eastern powers appeared to band together to navigate their fraught relationships with the Biden administration, amid the quickly changing geopolitical landscape resulting from Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

Israel Blocked Spyware for Ukraine, Estonia The Israeli government rejected requests from Ukraine and Estonia in recent years to

purchase and use Pegasus - the powerful spyware tool - to hack Russian mobile phone numbers, according to people with knowledge of the discussions. Israel feared that selling the cyberweapon to adversaries of Russia would damage Israel's relationship with the Kremlin, they said. Both Ukraine and Estonia had hoped to buy Pegasus to gain access to Russian phones, presumably as part of intelligence operations targeting their increasingly menacing neighbour in the years before the current crisis but Israel's Ministry of Defence refused to grant licenses to NSO Group, the company that makes Pegasus, to sell to Estonia and

Saudi Arabia said it will not bear responsibility for any shortages in the global oil supply after Yemen's Houthi rebels struck Saudi energy facilities in at least three cities over the weekend. The official Saudi Press Agency carried a statement that said the attacks by the Iran-aligned

Houthis pose a danger to the global oil supply and will have "dire effects on the production, processing and refining sectors." The statement asked the international community to stand "firmly" against the Houthis and prevent their "destructive attacks that pose a direct threat to the security of petroleum supplies in these highly sensitive circumstances that global energy markets are witnessing.' **CALENDAR:** UPCOMING MEI EVENTS
